#### A LITTLE HISTORY AND INFO...

- Location: Caribbean
- Area comparative: Smaller than Maryland
- Climate: Tropical
- Terrain: mostly rough and mountainous
- Natural Hazards: Hurricanes; severe storms; flooding and earthquakes; droughts
- Environment current issues: extensive deforestation (for fuel); soil erosion; inadequate supplies of potable water
- Languages: French (official), Creole (official)

- **Religion:** Roman Catholic 80%, Protestant 16%. *note:* roughly half of the population practices voodoo
- **Population:** 9,801,664 (July 2012 est.)
- **Life expectancy at birth:** 62.51 years
- Major infectious diseases: high food/ waterborne, vector borne, and water contact diseases (2009)
- Children under the age of 5 years underweight: 18.9% (2006)
- Literacy: Age 15 and over can read and write; 52% literacy total population
- Chief of state: President Michel MARTELLY (since 14 May 2011)
   Head of government: Prime Minister Laurent LAMOTHE (since 16 May 2012)

#### BACKGROUND OF HAITI

The native Taino Amerindians - who inhabited the island of Hispaniola when it was discovered by Christopher COLUMBUS in 1492 - were virtually annihilated by Spanish settlers within 25 years. In the early 17th century, the French established a presence on Hispaniola. In 1697, Spain ceded to the French the western third of the island, which later became Haiti. The French colony, based on forestry and sugar-related industries, became one of the **wealthiest in the Caribbean but only through the heavy** importation of African slaves and considerable environmental degradation. In the late 18th century, Haiti's nearly half million slaves revolted under Toussaint L'OUVERTURE. After a prolonged struggle, Haiti became **the first black republic to** declare independence in 1804. The poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, Haiti has been plagued by political violence for most of its history. After an armed rebellion led to the forced resignation and exile of President Jean-Bertrand ARISTIDE in February 2004, an interim government took office to organize new **elections under the auspices of the United Nations.** Continued violence and technical delays prompted repeated postponements, but Haiti finally did inaugurate a democratically elected president and parliament in May of 2006. A massive magnitude 7.0 earthquake struck Haiti in January 2010 with an epicenter about 25 km (15 mi) west of the capital, Port-au-Prince. Over 300,000 people were killed and some 1 million left homeless. The earthquake was assessed as the worst in this region over the last 200 years.

#### THE ECONOMY

• Poverty, corruption, and poor access to education for much of the population are among Haiti's most serious disadvantages. Haiti's economy suffered a severe setback in January 2010 when a 7.0 magnitude earthquake destroyed much of its capital city, Port-au-Prince, and neighboring areas. Already the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere with 80% of the population living under the poverty line and 54% in abject poverty, the earthquake inflicted \$7.8 billion in damage.

Following the earthquake, Haiti received \$4.59

billion in international pledges for

reconstruction, which has proceeded slowly.

• **Unemployment rate:** 40.6% (2010 est.)

• **Population below poverty line:** 

80\% (2003 est.)
